If you are dropping a seminar or colloquium, you must have the signature of the professor. After April 29, students will not be permitted to withdraw from any class and will be required to complete all coursework.

Please note that in-class examinations begin promptly at the time stated in the examination schedule. Please arrive at the exam room 15-20 minutes before the start time of the exam. This will give you time to set up and receive exam materials and instructions from the proctors. Please make sure that you bring your exam ID number and your NYU I.D. card with you to all exams.

Check Your Exam Schedule Now

Please take the time now to review your Spring 2008 examination schedule and note it on your calendar. Students are responsible for taking their exams when scheduled. If you misread the examination schedule or forget to note the dates of your exams now, you will not be eligible for a postponement.

Notice to Graduating 3L Students

Graduating 3L students should review the requirements for their degree to determine that they are on track for graduation and fill out the Degree Progress Checklist (www.law.nyu.edu/depts/acservices/downloads/documents/DegreeProgressChecklistfor3Ls.pdf). Incomplete Work from Prior Semesters

Graduating students who currently have a grade of incomplete in any course (or seminar) taken in a prior semester must complete and submit all work to their professor by May 1. The professor may not extend the deadline beyond May 1. If a graduating student's work is not submitted by this date, the Law School cannot guarantee graduation in May or Bar certification for the student.

It is your responsibility to contact your professors, some of whom may not be on campus this semester, and make arrangements for the timely submission of incomplete coursework.

Graduating students must submit all work for current semester courses by the last day of the examination period (Wednesday, May 14).

Health Services Compliance at Time of Graduation

A student who, at the time of graduation, is not in compliance with New York State health law requirements for immunization against measles, mumps and rubella and/or the requirement for either agreeing to waive the meningitis vaccination or provide proof of same, will not be certified (and transcript and diploma will not be printed). Financial Arrears at Time of Graduation

A student who, at the time of graduation, is financially obligated to the Bursar for tuition, housing (including summer housing after the final semester), any NYU library or other departments will have a stop placed on their account and will not be certified for state bar examinations, have official transcripts issued, or have a diploma issued until all arrears have been paid. It is the student's responsibility to make sure all accounts are cleared prior to May 2008.

Examination Numbers—Spring 2008

Examination numbers for Spring 2008 are now available. To access your personal examination number, log on to ALBERT and follow the instructions to view your Spring 2008 class schedule. Your examination number will appear directly below your schedule. Your examination number changes every semester, and using an incorrect exam number can result in a delay in processing your grades. If you are unable to access your examination number, kindly inform the Office of Records and Registration, Furman Hall, Room 400.

Bar Exam Certification

If you are interested in taking the bar exam on July 29-30, 2008, you must notify the Office of Records and Registration of your intent to do so within the stated deadlines. All interested students should complete the “State Bar Certification Request” form, available at www.law.nyu.edu/depts/acservices/downloads/index.html or in the Office of Records and Registration, and submit it to Furman Hall, Room 400. The filing dates for this form are as follows:

- March 31, 2008 through May 23, 2008
(to be certified for the July 2008 exam)

If you require any further assistance regarding this matter, please contact the Office of Records and Registration.

Loan Deferments

The NYU School of Law uses the National Student Loan Clearinghouse to confirm for lender institutions the enrollment status of students who receive financial aid. The clearinghouse processes all loan deferments and reports directly to lender institutions. Students with loan deferment forms from their lenders should bring them to the Office of Records and Registration in Furman Hall, Room 400. The forms will be forwarded to the clearinghouse by the Law School after the drop/add period. We will also ask you to sign a form indicating that you understand that processing is being done by the clearinghouse.

Veterans' Benefits

If you feel you are eligible for veterans' benefits, submit all appropriate documents to the Office of Records and Registration, Furman Hall, Room 400, for review.

Copies of Transcripts from Other Institutions

As stated in the admissions application, “We cannot return nor provide any copies of any part of the application, transcripts, translations, letters of recommendation, or supporting material.” Please make arrangements to have this information forwarded to you from your school in advance of your deadlines for the interview process, fellowship applications and bar applications.

Name Changes

A change-of-name form can be obtained from the Records Office, Furman Hall, Room 400. The form must be notarized and returned to that office in order to effect a name change. Name changes are not entered on the student records once a student has received his or her degree and is no longer registered for courses.

Transcript Requests—Plan In Advance

Transcript requests are processed by the University Registrar, and it usually takes from five to seven business days to obtain a transcript. Therefore, we ask that if you anticipate a need for transcripts, please make your requests well in advance of the date needed. Remember, it is possible to receive three transcripts per semester for yourself. We suggest that you order three transcripts to use in case a sudden need arises. After the third transcript request, the University Registrar requires that you include the address of the prospective employer when making a request. Transcript requests can be made in the Office of Records and Registration in Furman Hall, Room 400, or by mail to University Registrar, Transcript Services, P.O. Box 910, New York, NY 10276. Requests can also be faxed to the University Registrar at (212) 995-4154. You may arrange to pick up your transcripts in Furman Hall, Room 400, or have them sent to your local address or prospective employer.

Please note: If you are in need of an emergency transcript, Student Services, located at 25 West 4th Street, can now process emergency transcripts for School of Law students (only ONE transcript will be granted per student).

Credit/Fail Option

Second- and third-year students may elect to register for a total of two courses on a credit/fail basis during their final four semesters, provided the professor has listed the course as being open to such registration. Required courses, including Constitutional Law and Professional Responsibility, may not be taken credit/fail. Students who wish to register for the credit/fail option must do so by calling TorchTone at (212) 995-4747 during the credit/fail registration period, January 22-April 29.

Center on the Administration of Criminal Law Seeks Research Fellows

The newly-established Center on the Administration of Criminal Law is taking applications from current 1Ls to serve as research fellows during the 2008-09 academic year. The center will work on issues of criminal law and justice, especially issues implicating practices of prosecutors. The center will conduct research, publish scholarship and host conferences; litigate criminal cases as amicus and on the merits; and participate in legislative, policy and media debates on important issues of criminal law. Research fellows will receive \$5,000 and will be expected to work approximately 10 hours per week. The program awards at least two students annually with a salaried summer associate position and a \$50,000 scholarship (\$15,000 will be distributed during the students' third year of law school, and a payment of the additional \$35,000 will be awarded contingent upon receipt and acceptance of an offer of permanent employment). If you are currently a federal loan borrower and want to borrow federal loans again next year, you must complete the 2008-09 FAFSA. Completing the FAFSA early will decrease the chance of delays in receiving your funds during the 2008-09 academic year.

Tax Law Review Scholarships

The *Tax Law Review* will award scholarships for the 2008-09 academic year to students. The *TLR* is a faculty-edited journal of tax policy. The winners of the *TLR* Scholarships serve as student editors who help with cite checking, proofreading, etc. The scholarship is one-half tuition. This involves a commitment of approximately 15 hours a week.

Usually, one or two of these scholarships are awarded to J.D./LL.M. (tax) students. Those who are eligible to apply are current second-year students interested in the joint degree. A student must have completed basic income taxation; priority will be given to a student who has taken an additional tax course(s). This is a merit-based scholarship; selection will be based on NYU performance, college performance, work experience, writing ability, etc.

A student who is interested in applying for the scholarship should submit the following to Professor Deborah Schenk, the editor-in-chief, in Vanderbilt Hall, Room 416 by the end of classes: 1) a letter indicating your interest, 2) a law school transcript (unofficial is okay), 3) a résumé and 4) a writing sample. The writing sample can be a lawyering assignment, a paper written for a class, a memo written for a summer job, etc.

The employer selection module has opened on CSM and will remain open until Wednesday, July 9. You may log into CSM to view participating employers and begin your employer research. To complete the online employer selection process, please refer to pages 10-12 in the Student Handbook, which was distributed at the Strike-A-Match sessions and is available in the CSM document library. The deadline for submitting your 50 (40 maximum in New York City) employer selections is July 9. As mentioned at Strike-A-Match, students who are concerned about their grades are strongly encouraged to submit their list for review by an OCS counselor prior to this deadline. If you wish to have your list reviewed, you must submit it to OCS by June 11. The employer selection module is a lottery-based system, which means that there is no advantage to submitting early—all requests will be entered into the lottery after we close the module on July 9. Torture Team: Rumsfeld's Memo and the Betrayal of American Values

Beyond the infamous memo signed by Donald Rumsfeld, what do we really know about the torture that the U.S. government has signed off on? Philippe Sands, a seasoned prosecutor of war criminals including Augusto Pinochet and Slobodan Milosevic, details the systemic abuse at Guantánamo, including never-before-published interviews with the lawyers and military officials that admit to compliance with interrogation orders coming from the top. And to be certain, it doesn't stop at Guantánamo. The techniques have migrated from Gitmo to Abu Ghraib to Basra to Matrix Chamber. It is systemic, illegal, and will continue into the next administration unless there is a drastic policy change. Would any of the presidential hopefuls have that courage?
